The Davidson Institute for Talent Development is a national nonprofit organization dedicated to recognizing, nurturing and supporting profoundly gifted young people. Through its programs, the Davidson Institute strives to help profoundly intelligent students across the country develop their talents to make a positive difference.

Who We Serve

The Davidson Institute serves young people ages 5 through 17 who score in the 99.9th percentile on intelligence and achievement tests. We provide assistance in the form of support and resources to the families of profoundly intelligent youth and their educators.

The Davidson Young Scholars program provides FREE services designed to nurture the intellectual development of profoundly gifted young people ages 5 through 17.

Students and their families receive support in the following areas:

Consulting Services

Parents collaborate with a skilled team of Family Consultants who provide individualized services based on each family's needs. Services include:

- **Educational Advocacy and Planning** – Help for parents and teachers to find an appropriate educational fit for the Young Scholar.
- **Talent and Interest Development** – Assistance with locating summer programs, local and distance learning options, enrichment opportunities and other educational needs.
- **Child and Adolescent Development** – Access to relevant resources and nationally recognized experts.

Networking Opportunities

Students and parents can connect with other families who are sharing similar experiences through:

- **Annual Summit** – Young Scholars and their parents are invited to attend a special yearly event that hosts a variety of speakers, discussions and special activities.
- **Informal Regional Gatherings** – Parents frequently plan local get-togethers with other Young Scholar families in their area.
- **Online Community** – Access to private Young Scholar parent and student networks through discussion forums, chat rooms, electronic mailing lists and website.



To qualify, applicants must:

- be age 5 to 16 when applying;
- have a qualifying score on accepted intelligence and/or achievement tests;
- submit one letter of recommendation; and
- be a U.S. citizen or a permanent U.S. resident living in the United States.

Davidson Young Scholars

The Davidson Academy of Nevada is a FREE public school for profoundly gifted middle and high school students.

Located on the University of Nevada, Reno campus, students attend classes at the Academy, and may access university courses for advanced studies. Unlike traditional school settings, The Davidson Academy's classes do not group students by age, but by ability level. Each student works with staff to build a Personalized Learning Plan. This "living document" leads students through the core curriculum and helps them make elective decisions based on interest and ability.

Producing well-rounded students is a priority for The Davidson Academy. In addition to classes, many students also participate in school clubs and extracurricular activities available in the Reno-Lake Tahoe area. Clubs at the Academy include student council, chess, environmental awareness, math, science society, community service, student newspaper, speech and debate, drama and yearbook.

To qualify, applicants must:

- be performing at an academic level of 6th grade or higher;
- score 99.9% or above on accepted intelligence tests or on the ACT, SAT or Explore test;
- provide transcripts, grade reports and/or homeschooling records;
- submit three letters of recommendation; and
- be a resident of the state of Nevada while attending the Academy.

The THINK Summer Program is a three-week residential summer camp for gifted 13- to 16-year-old students, located on the University of Nevada, Reno campus.

Students can earn six transferable college credits by completing two university-level courses taught by university professors. "THINKers" take one college course in the morning and another in the afternoon. Classes are specifically designed for exceptionally gifted students interested in a challenging academic summer program. Participants receive an official college transcript upon completion of the program.

In addition to a unique academic experience, THINK is also a great opportunity to make friends with those who have similar interests and abilities. Students enjoy chaperoned on-campus activities as well as off-campus cultural events in the Reno-Lake Tahoe area.

Tuition for THINK includes course credits, room, board and planned activities. Financial assistance is available based on need. Enrollment is limited to 60 students. Homeschooled students are eligible to apply.

- be 13 to 16 years old during THINK;
- have a qualifying SAT or ACT score;
- submit two letters of recommendation; and
- be a U.S. citizen or a permanent U.S. resident living in the United States.

The Davidson Fellows Scholarship awards \$50,000, \$25,000 and \$10,000 scholarships to extraordinary young people under the age of 18 who have completed a significant piece of work.

Davidson Fellows applicants must contribute a project or portfolio recognized as an outstanding accomplishment by experts in the field and has the potential to benefit society in one of the following categories: Mathematics, Science, Literature, Music, Technology, Philosophy and Outside the Box (graduate level work in another field).

To be eligible, an applicant's submission must be an exceptionally creative demonstration of existing knowledge; a new idea with high impact; a unique application; an innovative solution with broad-range implications; an important advancement that can be replicated and built upon; an interdisciplinary discovery with the potential to effect positive change; or other demonstration of extraordinary accomplishment.

Davidson Fellows are honored every year in Washington, D.C. with congressional meetings and a special awards ceremony. There is no minimum age to apply.

- submit three nominator forms; and
- be a U.S. citizen or a permanent U.S. resident living in the United States.

Characteristics of Intellectually Advanced Young People

Highly intelligent youth are often not properly identified. Research shows this can lead to underachievement or even dropping out of school. The following are common characteristics of profoundly gifted young people:

- An extreme need for constant mental stimulation.
- An ability to learn and process complex information rapidly.
- A need to explore subjects in surprising depth.
- An insatiable curiosity, endless questions and inquiries.
- A need for precision in thinking and expression – often answering questions with, “That depends...”
- An ability to focus intently on a subject of interest for long periods of time.
- An inability to concentrate on a task that is not intellectually challenging, including repetitious ideas or material presented in small pieces.
- A tendency toward underachievement, particularly for those who want to “fit in” with their classmates.
